

Recommended items: 6 counters for your child	<ul> <li>Use <u>flash cards</u> and have your child identify numerals 1-16 out of sequence</li> <li>Go on a numeral hunt in your house.</li> </ul>	Sing Five Green and Speckled Fogs Song.  • Encourage your child to use their fingers to show how many frogs are on the log.  • Make up word problems and have your child use some type of counter, such as pennies or rocks to solve the problem. For example: "If there are 2 frogs on the log, and 2 frogs in the pond, how many frogs do you have all together?"	How Many Spots?  Ladybug Math Activity	Use daily routines to have your child practice counting skills. For example, during snack time have your child count how many goldfish crackers are on their napkin.		
Free Choice Activities 30 Minutes	Giving children choices helps them feel like they have some power and control over their learning. Think of one of your child's favorite play activities. Allow him or her to choose an activity that involves playing with adults or other children in the home.

## Drain

Extend arms out, pretending your arms are faucets. Tighten arm, shoulder, and face muscles. Exhale slowly making a "sssshhh" sound and release all your muscles, draining out the stress.

Smile, Take a deep breath And Relax.
Encourage belly breathing where the tummy goes out when the air goes in, and in when the air goes out. Also help children learn to exhale slower than they inhale.



## Pretzel

Standing up, cross your ankles. Now cross your right wrist over left, turn your hands so your thumbs are facing the floor, put palms together and interlace fingers. Bend your elbows out and gently turn your hands down and toward your body until they rest on the center of your chest. Put your tongue on the roof of your mouth. Relax and breathe.



# Balloon

Place your hands on top of your head and interlace your fingers. Breathe in through your nose as you raise your arms, inflating an imaginary balloon. Release the air in the balloon by pursing your lips, exhaling slowly, lowering your arms and making a "pbpbbpbbbb" sound.


### Baby Bumblebee Finger-play


I'm bringing home a baby bumblebee, (Pretend to hold a bumblebee by cupping hands together)

Ouch! It stung me!




I'm squishing up the baby bumblebee, (Pretend to squish up imaginary beebumble with hands)

Now that's better!





